


High index of suspicion for malaria. ASK TRAVEL HISTORY/RESIDENCE


Every patient with fever/ flu-like illness/acute

progressive illness + travel to malaria area/residence in

malaria area = MALARIA until disproved irrespective of

consideration for COVID-19

 COMPULSORY - blood smear or RDT for malaria

Repeat if negative

RX- Coartem uncomplicated Artesunate severe





11 year old, resident in Northern Namibia – Cape Town holiday Xmas

- Fever-? Flu,? COVID
- Progressive jaundice ? viral hepatitis
- Depressed level of consciousness-? meningitis
- Admitted ICU

Healthy.....then within hours.... multiple visits to health facility

Fever ...vomiting...then... lethargic..... then

Always consider **meningococcal disease** in acute/rapidly progressive febrile illness in young patients

15 year old

0200hrs fever, headache, 'sore throat', FBC normal, anti-pyretic, macrolide


1200 hrsvomitting, lethargic, abdominal pain, cat scan – normal, anti-emetic

WCC 1 000, platelets 75 000

All the pieces of the puzzle must fit

- · Where do you play, stay, school, travel
- Exposures- pets 'insects', plants, food, occupation of family members
- Outbreaks/endemic diseases in area
- · Drugs, vaccines
- Immune status
- Dermatology
- Systemic symptoms and signs, progression of illness



Monkey pox in endemic area

- Unexplained progressive multi-system illness- <u>taxi malaria</u> (MISC-C, other). Thrombocytopaenia common in malaria
- Progressive, fatal encephalitis (esp if normal CSF, normal CAT Scan (MRI –gray matter) think rabies
- Current....influenza, measles, polio (MOZ, Malawi), all vaccinepreventable infections, norovirus, typhoid
- IPC always, needlestick injury- confirm diagnosis in patient (not only Hep B, HIV)
